

Crochet camel stitch

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While it may be tempting to rush through the finish so you can finally see the completed project, it's important not to rush through sewing seams and weaving yarn tails if you want the end result to look polished and professional. Lock each piece before assembling, and let the parts dry. This helps the edges stay flat as you work. Shoulder seams (associated edges) Step 1: Put both parts flat, right side up. Thread the needle yarn, and starting with the right side of the edge of the piece closest to you (bottom), insert the needle from the back to the front through the center of the first stitch. Pull the yarn through, leaving the yarn tail to weave later. Step 2: Insert the needle from right to left under two vertical legs of the first stitch on a piece farther away from you (Figure 25a), then insert the needle from right to left under the following two vertical legs on the near piece, starting with the same hole as the first stitch. Pull the yarn gently to adjust the stitch and close the stitches together. Shoulder seams: Figure 25a Step 3: Continue to alternate the sides by inserting the needle from right to left under two strands and starting with the same hole as the last stitch was made. Pull the yarn every few stitches to adjust it and close the seam. At the end of the seam, weave into the yarn tail. The mattress stitch mattress stitch is a big stitch to know when it comes to sewing vertical seams, including side and sleeved seams. Step 1: Thread the yarn needle with the appropriate color of the yarn, causing the four inch tail to weave in later. With both parts flat and right side up, insert the needle under the horizontal thread between the first and second stitches of the first row on one piece and the corresponding threads on the second part. Gently pull the yarn to tighten. Step 2: Insert the needle under the horizontal thread on the next row of one piece, then insert the needle under the strand on the same row of the other part. Step 3: Continue to work under horizontal strands, alternating the pieces until you have six to eight strings worked (Figure 25b) and then pull the yarn gently to close the seam. Mattress Stitch: Figure 25b Step 4: Continue weaving together until the end of the seam. Weave the yarn tails into the seam stitches, and secure. Backstitch Backstitch is an easy way to make a solid seam. Step 1: Thread the needle tapestry with the appropriate yarn. On the right side together, work on the wrong side about one stitch in from the edges. Work the two works stitches on top of each other to secure the lower edges (Figure 26a). Step 2: With the needle and yarn at work, insert the needle through both layers of fabric about two stitches to the left of the running stitch and pull the yarn to the front of the work. Step 3: Insert the needle from front to back with one stitch back to the right, working through both layers. Step 4: Moving forward to the left about two stitches, bring the needle to the front of the work, about one stitch original stitch. Repeat the process until you reach the end of the seam, working one stitch back (right) on the front of the work and two stitches forward (left) on the back of the work. Step 5: Finish the seam by working two or three running stitches on each other, stitching through the bound edges. Weave their tails into the yarn. A three-needle bind-off that bind-off finishes two edges, tying the stitches and closing the seam at the same time. Usually used to close the shoulders, it can also be used to close the side seams when working clothes from side to side. You can also pick up stitches along two side edges and then use three needle binding-offs to close those stitches. To make a flat, neat seam on the right side, follow these instructions. Step 1: On the right side work together, and with needle tips aligned and face to right (Figure 27a), hold both needles in your left hand. Three Needle Bind-Off: Figure 27a Step 2: Insert an empty right needle into the first stitch on each of the two needles in the left hand, and knit two stitches together (Figure 27b). Slide them off the needle as you would knit the stitch. Now you have one stitch on the right needle. Three Needle Bind-Off: Figure 27b Step 3: Tie the next pair of stitches in the same way. Now you have two stitches on the right needle. Step 4: Pull the first stitch on the right needle over the second stitch (closest to the tip), just as you would in a normal binding-off (Figure 27c). Three Needle Bind-Off: Figure 27c Step 5: Repeat Steps 3 and 4 until all the stitches have been tied. Cut the yarn and pull the end through the last cycle; weave in the end to provide. Kitchener stitch (or grafting) This method connects live stitches together in a bouncy, invisible seam. The method can also be used through related stitches to make a strong, stable seam. With an equal number of stitches on the two needles, and the right sides up, keep the needles parallel to each other with the dots facing to the right. Thread a blunt needle tapestry with a two to three fold length area to be connected. For live stitches, the work is as follows: Step 1: Insert a threaded needle into the first stitch on the front needle purlwise (as if purl). Leave the stitch on the needle. Step 2: Insert the needle into the first stitch on the back of the knit needle (as if to knit). Leave the stitch on the needle. Step 3: Insert the needle into the same first stitch on the front of the knitted needle (Figure 28a); slip the stitch off the needle. Kitchener Stitch: Figure 28a Insert the needle into the next front stitch purlwise; Leave the stitch on the needle (Figure 28b). Kitchener stitch: Figure 28b Step 4: Insert the needle into the same stitch on the back of the needle purlwise (Figure 28c); slip the stitch off the needle. Kitchener stitch: Figure 28c Insert the needle into the next rear knitted stitch; Leave the stitch on the needle (Figure 28d). Kitchener Stitch: Figure 28d Repeat steps 3 and 4 until all stitches are working. Tip: To make a technique how you work, remember this... Front needle: purlwise to leave on, knitted to take off. Rear needle: jersey to leave on, purlwise take off. Weaving in Yarn Tails Carefully weaving into yarn ends makes your knitting look neat and keeps it from pulling loose and unravelling over time. Thread the needle tapestry with a yarn tail. Working on the wrong side of knitting, weave the needle in and out of the back of the stitches for a few inches in one direction, then turn and run in the opposite direction by an inch or two. Pull the yarn gently to tighten, and cut it close to work. Slightly pull the knitting so that the tail disappears into the last stitch.
